## UFCW Members in Ohio Rally to Save the Middle Class

Hundreds of members from Locals 75, 880, 17A and 379\* joined over 10,000 workers and their families last week in front of Ohio's statehouse in Columbus to express their opposition to Ohio's Republican Governor John Kasich political power grab to silence the voice of workers.

"We are here to support all of my fellow union members and workers across the State of Ohio by opposing this bill," said Malcolm Philips, a UFCW Local 75 member who attended the rally. "This is about the middle class."

This bill, known as Senate Bill 5 (SB5), was passed last week in the State Senate by a vote of 17-16, while thousands of middle class workers stood outside the statehouse chanting "kill the bill."

If it's passed by the Republican-controlled House and signed by Gov. Kasich, it would curtail collective bargaining rights for public workers in the state.

"In the long run this bill will affect all of the middle class people, because if they pass it for government workers it is going to cause a trickledown effect that is going to touch every aspect in every union," said Kim Buckley from Local 880.

Working families in Ohio continue to stand up against this bill. They are organizing rallies across Ohio to tell their representatives that they should "kill SB5." **OP**

## University of Notre Dame Report Refutes "Right to Work" Claims

A report presented last Thursday at Indiana's statehouse by labor experts from the University of Notre Dame's Higgins Labor Studies Program exposes the myths of "right to work" laws.

This report titled "Right-to-Work vs. The Rights of Workers" shows several facts that indicate how workers in non-right-to-work states have higher standards of living.

It also highlights the importance of labor unions and collective bargaining in keeping decent wages, working conditions, benefits and human dignity.

The authors document how corporations and big business have supported anti-labor policies that have lowered wages and increased income inequality, ultimately undermining America's middle class. **OP**
