

UFCW Honors Legacy of Dr.King with Historic Display of Solidarity

UFCW members joined together in unity with workers across the country to mark the 43rd anniversary of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. – and to fight for his dream of economic justice and dignity for all. Building on the momentum that started in states like Wisconsin and has now spread across the country – members took part in solidarity actions at over 2,500 worksites nationwide. Over 650,000 members expressed their support by wearing "Sticking Together for Working Families" stickers while others gathered at rallies and other community events.

The response from UFCW Locals across the country was overwhelming.
