Planning to Vote in Virginia?



BETTER BRING A PHOTO ID

Every voter casting a ballot in person must show identification.

- Acceptable forms of ID include:
- Virginia voter photo ID card
- Valid Virginia driver's license
- Valid U.S. passport
- Military IDEmployer-issued photo ID card
- Any federal, Virginia state or local government-issued ID
- Valid college or university photo identification card from an institution of higher learning located in Virginia
- If you do not have an acceptable photo ID, you're eligible to receive a FREE Virginia voter photo identification card.

You can get your **FREE Virginia voter photo ID** card by following three simple steps:

- **1. Find a registrar's office.** Visit www.sbe.virginia.gov or contact the Virginia Department of Elections at 800-552-9745 to find the registrar's office nearest you.
- **2. Go to the registrar's office.** Fill out the Voter Photo Identification Application. Be sure to include the last four digits of your Social Security number, birth date and signature. Get your picture taken and sign your name on the signature pad.
- **3. Receive your ID card.** Your new ID should arrive in the mail within seven to 10 business days.

The deadline to register to vote in the upcoming election is Oct. 14. New voters are eligible to receive a FREE Virginia voter photo ID card. Simply ask the registrar for a voter registration application, complete it and follow the steps for getting a Virginia voter photo ID. You will receive your ID in the mail once your registration is processed.
